be more patriotic and do more for the ancestral homeland - Ukraine, than almost anybody inside our country. This community lives with Ukrainian traditions in its blood. Our singing of Ukrainian songs always was full of passion and patriotism. I think our generation could change much in our country. CANADA-UKRAINE PARLIAMENTARY PROGRAM HONOURED

(CUPP-Kyiv) Ambassador Abina Dann hosted a reception on December 7, 2007 on the occasion of the 17th anniversary of the Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Internship program. Over 150 CUPP Alumni from university centres in Luhansk, Donetsk, Dnipropetrovsk, Sumy, Lutsk, Rivne, Chernivtsi, Ivano Frankivsk, Yalta, Odesa, as well as Brussels, Warsaw, Amsterdam and Toronto, attended the reception. Representatives of the Ukrainian Parliament, the Constitutional Court of Ukraine and the arts community of Kyiv were also in attendance.

Ambassador Dann, in her opening remarks, welcomed the graduates and organizers of the CUPP program and stated that she was proud of Canada's initiatives such as the recognition of Ukraine's independence and the establishment of the first and only parliamentary educational assistance program for Ukrainian university students by Canada.

The CUPP program was established in the Spring of 1990 by agreement with the Speaker of the House of Commons, John Fraser, and the Chair of Ukrainian Studies Foundation of Toronto. The agreement granted Ukrainian university students access to the Canadian House of Commons with privileges enjoyed by interns of the Canadian Parliamentary Program and the Canada USA Parliamentary Program, which both preceded CUPP. In the Spring of 1991, three students from universities in Kyiv and Lviv arrived for the first internship which in succeeding years brought an additional 600 students to the Canadian Parliament. Over the past 17 years, over 20,000 university students from Ukraine have applied for the program.

In attendance at the reception were CUPP graduates who today are in the foreign service of Ukraine, the Government of Ukraine, the Secretariate of the Constitutional Court of Ukraine, as well as the first CUPP Alumni to be elected to the Ukrainian Parliament, Elina Shyshkina, who completed her internship in 2003 and was elected to Verkhovna Rada in 2007.

Written greetings were received from Prime Minister Stephen Harper who wrote: "For the past 17 years, the Parliament of Canada has benefited from the outstanding Ukrainian university students who have participated in this renowned internship program. Judging from the accomplishments of these students and the successful completion of the internships year after year, it can be said that they are Ukraine's best and brightest. I hope that the work experience in our parliament has prepared them to continue to excel in the numerous and ambitious ventures that they will pursue."

Toronto MP, Borys Wrzesnewskyj, in his greetings said: "Established in 1991 thanks to the vision and leadership of Mr. Ihor Bardyn, the CUPP has become one of the most successful student internship programs operating in the Parliament of Canada. Through Mr. Bardyn's continued dedication and guidance, CUPP from every interns major Ukrainian university have been provided an opportunity to learn and experience first-hand Canada's parliamentary proce-

IMPRESSIONS FROM A TRIP TO CANADA

The quickest and the most general impression of Canada is that it is a mix of ancient traditions which were brought to North America by French, English and other immigrants and the more recent d modernity associated with the globalization of the world. The month spent in Canada helped me set some life priorities, see many things in new light, understand the way my country Ukraine should evolve.

It was a great honour and pleasure for me to have an opportunity to observe the Canadian parliament from the inside and to work in the office of Mr. Peter Goldring, MP for Edmonton East. And an important difference between MPs in Canada and Ukraine is their attitude towards the people who elected them. MPs are the servants of the people and should not lose sight of this.

This principle is well implemented in Canada through the majority system of elections, responsibilities of the MPs for designated ridings or constituencies, and each vote counts and is heard. To my mind Ukraine changed its system of electing MPs much too fast from 50/50 majority-proportional system to a fully proportional system of electing Members of Parliament. This created the problem that politicians in Ukraine elected from a list and responsible to no riding or constituency, forget about the voters as soon as they are elected. It is a problem of morality and we have a long way to go to rectify this situation.

The Province of Ontario recently held a Referendum (in fact during the period of our Internship in the Canadian Parliament) on the proposition of electing some members of the provincial parliament, using the proportional system. Ontarians were wise in rejecting the proportional system. It is very difficult to reverse proportional system of electing MPs, once these MPS have tasted the freedom from being responsible to an identified district and the voters living in that district in this direction. Proportional system may look good because it appears to give small and fringe parties a voice in Parliament. But the system deprives a much larger group of voices from registering their concerns with Parliament. My advice to Ontario and to Canada, Don't do it. You will regret it like the millions of Ukrainians.

The Canada Ukraine Parliamentary Program or CUPP to us CUPPers, exists mainly due to the efforts of the Ukrainian Speaking about the Diaspora. Canadian Ukrainians they are wonderful people and I'd like to highlight their contribution to the building of Canadian society and the work done by them in seeking to prevent their total assimilation. It's easy to lose your identity, your ethno-cultural affiliation in t a multinational democratic country. When people have a choice and are not restricted in using their native language or to cultivate traditions of their ancestors, there exists a paradox that in such an



environment people tend to more readily assimilate to the new country's culture and traditions. It should be pointed out that the meaning of the term "culture" differs in Ukraine (or other countries with a long history and traditions) from the meaning in Canada. During our meeting with MP Peggy Nash we discussed the defense of Canadian culture, by preventing the informational dependence on the USA. In other words we spoke more about the mass-media, journals, newspapers, the influence of Hollywood rather than about traditions, language, holidays, theatres, operas etc.

A few words should be said about religion. The Ukrainian-Canadian community (as well as French-Canadian community), especially the young people, have forgotten about religion and spiritual self-development. We met with representatives of the Ukrainian Catholic and Ukrainian Orthodox churches in Canada and I took from these meetings an understanding for this predicament. This predicament arose because of the situation that the church became a surrogate for national and independent state aspirations by the Ukrainian Diaspora. And the churches fed this need by stressing nationality and, language rather than faith.

Any religion satisfies two basic human demands. These are the demand for spirituality and the demand for affiliation to a group. The problem is that only the demand for spirituality is stsustaining or available from the church. The demand for affiliation to a group is not exclusive to the churches.

The need for affiliation to a group can be made available by fellow citizens or fellow workers or many more. When the French Canadians were allowed into the governing structures of Canada and participate fully in the political, economic life of the country, their affiliation or dependence on the church vanished. And that's because the church had overlooked to satisfy the need for spirituality.

I'd like to mention some negative things that exist in Canada. For me they are negative in a way I wouldn't like to see them in Ukraine. They are caused by the specific of this country; it's political, social and economic system. North American societies live a very dynamic life, leaving for food less time than it should be. The other aspect is that the need for cheaper products creates the problem of genetically modified food. All these lead to the health problems. Despite the fact that the average life expectancy of Canadian citizens is extremely high nobody knows how those factors can influence the next generations. I was told strange stories about newly created children disease – allergy for many usual and everyday life things, for instance cloth, food, fragrances and about teachers who carry much medicine with them in case of emergency. Another feature I'd like to notion is the policy of the government for stimulating the immigration and giving preferences for applying job to visible minorities whose professional and social structure is worse than that of Canada. Despite my understanding of the government's view I consider this policy as breaking the equality, the basic principal of democracy, as it's not a solution to change one kind of discrimination into another. I suggest giving preferences for studying in the colleges and universities instead of preferences for applying a job or giving them for a defined period of time, for instance 3 years after becoming a citizen.

And in conclusion I'd like to outline those directions in which Canada-Ukraine relationship can develop. They are: nuclear power generating, oil and gas production, urban planning, building technologies, consulting, financial services and certainly tourism. To my mind Ukraine and Canada have a big potential in establishing connections in nuclear energy field. In 2005, seventeen countries produced concentrated uranium oxides, with Canada (27.9% of world production) and Ukraine (1.9%). Ukraine has the biggest uranium-ore deposits in the world and despite the Chornobyl disaster we can't afford to refuse from this source of energy as we have no other alternative. Canada has a significant experience in using unenriched uranium for energy generating. As I learned from the internship in the office the committee of academics and scientists from each country was created for sharing precious experience. This cooperation seems to be extremely beneficial for us and helps Ukraine lessen the dependence on France and Russia – the countries where we enrich uranium. Another field of collaboration is connected with the dramatic development of communications and internet. The distance between two countries is not a problem now for many businesses. This is especially relevant for services, such as: finance, investment consulting, insurance brokerage and banking. And I expect to see the agencies of Canadian firms in Ukraine in the nearest future or at least as soon as Ukraine enters WTO.

But the area which needs to have the priority is tourism. It creates many work places, stimulates developing infrastructure, communications and is a pre-conditional factor of capital formation. Besides Canada was formed by different nations and accordingly the Canadian history is inalienable from the history of those countries from which the immigrants came. And large Ukrainian community in Canada seems to be a good factor for this business to be successful. Thus this field is perspective not only from the commercial point but also helps establish close Canada-Ukraine relationships.

There is a little store 30 meters from the Algonquin Hotel, our home away from home. Nothing special, but we used to visit it quite often. During such visits nobody, paid much attention to the man behind the counter who was serving us. Until one day I didn't have enough money with me to buy a sandwich. But this man just smiled and said, "Don't worry! This is my present for our Ukrainian friends!" It turned out he had worked at this store for many years. And the regular annual "flow" of Ukrainian students to this store became a good and beneficial tradition for this man. I explained to him what our Program is about, and that unfortunately we had to say goodbye to Ottawa soon, but I promised that another group of voung

Ukrainians will definitely pay a visit to his store next year.

The cafeteria at the West Bloc remains the most popular place among CUPP interns to have lunch. It is spacious enough to accommodate many clients, the meals are delicious, and, finally, only there can you meet Chef Louis, a Parliamentary Legend, in person!. It seems like this communicative Quebecer is a friend of everyone on Parliament Hill. Both MP's and their assistants become targets of his humor, but no one takes offense at these jokes. Naturally, CUPP Interns chatted with him quite often, especially our girls. My guess is that, some day Chef Louis will give up his pastas, sauces, and juliennes, in order to write a bestseller on Canadian politicians' culinary weaknesses and food secrets. Who knows, maybe several pages of that book will be devoted to the Ukrainian interns, who have been having lunch in his cafeteria for the past 17 years...

The CUPP traditional long weekend visit to Quebec and specifically Montreal, McGill University, Radio Canada International, McGill Ukrainian Student's Club, etc. turned out to be an interesting one. The first surprise, even before our departure, was that we got a female bus driver – in Ukraine it is quite unusual. We spent many hours in our school-bus, so it was a great opportunity to ask this lady bus driver all those questions we had about the life of ordinary Canadians. We talked our way through a good part of Ontario and



Quebec. Almost all the way from Ottawa to Montreal, then from Montreal to Mt. Tremblant, and back to Ottawa. We got to know how alone she raised two sons, and how she managed to pay all her bills, what prompted her to become a school bus driver, and why traffic lights in Ottawa are red and white, while in Montreal they are red and green. I listened to many stories about the life of this lady who spent many years driving across the country. And, perhaps, I listened to even more complaints about Ouebec authorities who don't install bilingual road and directional signs. You see our driver spoke no French.

Both our meetings with politicians and ambassadors, as well as with bus drivers and store owners are equally important components of our Canadian CUPP experience. All these people with their own life stories and perspectives helped our group of 20 Ukrainian Interns, to understand real Canada and Canadians. It would be appropriate to conclude with the words of a Ukrainian philosopher Hryhoriy Skovoroda who wrote "discover yourself first" and our CUPP Director's words of encouragement "I strongly urge you to pursue or continue your education abroad."

And when he continues, saying "you will discover a bit about yourself by listening to the life experiences of everyday Canadians. And you will be stronger for it in meeting whatever challenges life throws your way".



National security of Ukraine and its geopolitical choice

Ukraine's national security is directly influenced by its geographical location at the junction of four areas: Central and Western Europe, South East Europe, Eastern Europe and the Black Sea. The geopolitical location is thus extremely favourable, as the country is at the crossroads of main continental liaisons. This geo-strategic positioning represents an advantage in promoting a stabilization and engagement policy for these areas by developing intra- and inter-regional cooperation - in direct connection with international organizations (mainly UN, NATO, EU and OSCE) in order to counteract threats to continental and global security.

Ukraine belongs to Europe in the geo-political, cultural and economic sense. Our people shares European basic values which it has historically maintained and defended. Therefore, a strategy on integration with European structures, in which construction our country, despite its interests and public intentions, had no opportunity to participate before, must be a central plank of Government policy. For Ukraine, the accession to the EU and NATO means final overcoming the consequences of economic and political division of the continent.

Membership in the EU and NATO is a strategic objective of Ukraine and one of the main priorities of the Ukrainian government and economy. Ukraine's intention to gain membership is closely related to the desire to attain the fundamental goals of Ukrainian policy in the areas of national security, economy and social system. Euro-Atlantic integration is a historic opportunity for the entire Ukrainian society. In Ukraine the process of integration is supported by the main political forces and economic circles and ranks among the highest priorities.

The majority of Ukrainian society is ready to play an active part in the process of Euro-Atlantic integration. The integration will ensure peace and prosperity for all European nations. The Euro-Atlantic aspirations of the Ukrainians stem from their conviction that the EU plays a vital role in maintaining peace and democracy in Europe and worldwide. Ukraine fully shares the ideas and objectives of international organizations.

There is a discussion concerning whether Ukraine should first enter the EU or NATO. Though people who take one or the other side, regard the problem too subjectively and in isolation from such important criteria as economic situation, politics and the peculiarities of national consciousness in the country at a certain period of time.

Events on September, 11th, 2001 in the USA actually became the new starting point in the understanding of threats to national security of countries by terrorists "of a new generation. Perhaps, thanks the current political situation taken with the birth of the new political nation, the most powerful states of the world started the discussion on measures to improve the standards of national security. In Ukraine these regulations were taken into consideration since the onset of the "Orange Revolution", when the government did not dare to venture to use weapons (which is absolutely atypical of the former Soviet Union or modern Russia). Even then we emphasized that the new culture took root in Ukraine, where the main characteristics of protection was the fact, that authority did not risk to use weapons or force against the civilian population, in conditions of peaceful demonstrations..

My MP: Mario Silva, Toronto

Today in Ukraine, under difficult and unresolved political conditions, the prospects of national security are aggravated. Firstly, this is due to the coming to power of incompetent and partisan persons, whose chief purpose is selfenrichment, and for whom staying in power for this purpose is the sole aim.

How is it possible from the point of view of culture to provide for Ukraine's stability?

This goal can be achieved by the introduction of a democratic culture among the population, and in the structures of governance of the state as well as in corresponding structures and organizations (for example, in National Security Council, Department of Defense, Interior forces, Ministry of interior of Ukraine and others).

The introduction of standards of security, comprise the follow-ing components:

- Level of knowledge (political and official professionalism), understanding the state policy of development and responsibility for its execution on all levels (from senior leaders to basic executors); adherence to the standards and rules of national security providing.

- Level of availability, usage, improvement of the existing political, diplomatic, economical, financial, technical, ecological, military, boundary and other possibilities, instruments and means of providing national security.

- Level of standards and rules of safety procedure implementation; standards of behavior of the official personnel and common civil and population's vigilance, which are to be developed.

Summarizing the abovementioned, we can conclude, that security standards in a system of national security provision are laying in high, more responsible level.

Aiming to manage the security regulation standards, each action, which is executed in Ukraine concerning its security, can be deeply analyzed.

Can we consider Ukraine strong enough in the level of the

standard of national security? Unfortunately, it has not yet attained the desired standards in a number of different spheres.

- In the area of military, defense and territorial spheres. Ukraine does not have the necessary instruments of state organization for example to secure the 4000 kilometers of unprotected borders with Russia and Belarus. Importantly, upon Ukraine's entry into the EU and NATO, this would release the country from the necessity of having to secure its borders with four Western neighbors, belonging to Schengen area: Poland, Hungary, Slovakia, and Romania. Many resources would be released to meet other needs!

Conclusions:

1. Many regulations, connected to the standards of security for Ukraine, can be enumerated. Unfortunately too few have been implemented to secure Ukraine's integrity.

2. But the time for the implementation of national security standard has arrived. 3. Acquired experience, specialized knowledge dictate that Ukraine adopt measures which serve only the state and its citizens.

4. We should hope that for the security of the country's future Ukraine realizes the need to enter the EU and NATO, where there exists a culture of social security of each member-country.

5. It is necessary, that the next generation of youth must work honestly for the benefit of the Ukrainian state.

6. As a whole, the opinion of our citizens concerning the integration of Ukraine into NATO is not yet objective, because citizens are not informed about those economic and social advantages, guarantees of security, which only North-Atlantic Alliance can give us, and because of this public opinion vacillates between one and the other side. Thus to achieve membership in the EU and NATO, it is necessary to provide a policy of informatization among Ukrainians about these structures.

UKRAINE: TO BE with EUROPE OR NOT TO BE with RUSSIA?

Unlike Shakespeare's hero, who brought into clear focus the question of his very survival, the situation in Ukraine is quite different. In our case, standards of quality and prestige of living matter a lot. De jure we are a young European state with a lengthy and prominent history and with the symbolic geographical centre of Europe located in the delightful Carpathian Mountains. On the other hand, de facto that is, we are an independent country which since 1991 has kept struggling for its independence from Russia especially in the areas of energy, as well from the influences of cultural and political pressures from our neighbor. Hence, the problem can be outlined as follows: Ukraine is still at the crossroads; we are neither flesh nor fowl in worldly geopolitics. Until we get



rid of the age old Russian-propagated stereotypes about ourselves, and the self imposed attitudes to our country's problems, we continue to spin our wheels aimlessly, to no purpose. Too many of us look outwardly for improvement in our condition, not realizing that our future is in our own hands.

The basic impediments which do not release us out of this vicious circle are rather clear. Those are, the ongoing financial problems and mismanagement of both the national economy and under-funding of social projects; the absence of an orderly and meaningful policy of national consciousness encompassing language, historic and cultural aspects; and the last but not the least - the lack or absence of the rule of law and its equal application to all including politicians and bureaucrats, and the resultant is the surging corruption that follows. Confronting those problems head-on means removing the gridlock of inaction and turning Ukraine resolutely onto the European course.

It was exciting to hear the Orange Block of Parties during the past elections promise to remove or uncover the shadow from the national economy. The underground or shadow economy is anecdotally stated to be up to 60% of the country s total economy. Up to the present time no one has declared that our economy is now transparent and working on behalf of everyday citizens. While it cannot be expected that in a short period of time the economy can be uncovered or become transparent, it would be reasonable to expect some improvement in this field, but instead it seems that the interests of the different clans and non-existent industrial enterprises-phantoms continue to benefit...

It is a step in the right direction that the Government of Yulia Tymoshenko has started to reimburse ordinary citizens for their losses, but it is the least that the government should do to rectify an injustice. Unfortunately the cost of living keeps rising, the education system is not being overhauled so that students can get an effective education; young families are not getting a chance to find better accommodation in which to bring up their children. Theses are some of the concerns which our government should Hopefully, address. Prime Minister Tymoshenko will work for real growth of Ukraine rather than pursue her ambitions for the presidency. Speaking of the enerdependence on gy Russia. Ukraine should find the means to substitute dependency upon gas with alternative sources of energy.

There has been much discussion around the question of Ukrainian culture, Ukrainian language, and Ukrainian history.

Understandably we developed our culture through the centuries; we acquired our heroes and national symbols. But at the same time, Ukrainians should adopt useful attributes from the modern times. Moreover, a great part of Ukrainian "pride" was suggested or profoundly influenced by Russians. So Ukrainians should consider revisiting their history and approach it more respectfully or demand more honest interpretation of that history. However unappealing may it seem, it is worth looking at the example of Russia, where the government has set up a commission of historians, to elaborate a nationally focused history text-book? Why not to do the same in Ukraine, on more honest and fair terms of course? Then, all those who live in Ukraine, or have Ukrainian citizenship to have access to a fair & unbiased interpretation of our history. Concerning the state language, Ukrainian must have the right to develop and thrive to stay in a country-wide national environment of literature, media, and politics. That ought to be obvious to everyone, starting from simple "khokhly" and finishing with chauvinistic Muscovites.

Corruption can be called the most horrendous problem for any state, all the more so - for Ukraine, where a great number of things are sorted out with the help "a symbolic present of of homage" or a certain sum of money for achieving results in education, business or other fields. It exists everywhere. One can still ward off the policeman who stopped you for speeding by slipping him a 10-hryvnia bill. Many Doctors will not to you about an operation without some "encouragement" from you. You will find it hard to start a business without "a special talk" with local bureaucrats. Recently in China, several officials were executed after the charge in bribery, and that s in the country with a 2-billion population. Why can't we come to grips with the problem of corruption, in a country of 45 million?

One thing is clear – some really dramatic measures should be taken to put Ukraine on the right path towards European integration. And not just in words but in actions. Staying on the spot is tantamount to stagnation and degradation. Our major goal is to live, to be, and to be a prosperous country regardless of who we build relationships with. The question is not as to whether Ukraine is to be or not to be in Europe. That answer is obvious. Until every Ukrainian decides to make an about-turn in him or herself towards the success of the whole nation and let's go of the nostalgia of the past, we cannot count on a promising future.

Visit to Royal Military College, Queen's University in Kingston, ON

Three CUPP'07 interns Alla Myshalova, Ruslana Kostina and Oksana Kleutina, were delighted by the opportunity to enrich their internship by a visit to the historic city of Kingston. We had a unique chance to visit Kingston, the former capital of Canada.

During our stay in the beautiful city we saw Fort Henry, where over 5,000 Ukrainians were unjustly interned from 1914 to 1917. It gave us perceptive of the difficulties which Ukrainian immigrants experienced during the early period of the community's development. We also visited Royal Military College which for me was very inspiring, as I am among the proud students of Lviv Military Institute, one of the oldest military educational establishments in Ukraine. It was not only an honor, but also a great pleasure to visit RMC. I had the opportunity to compare two outstanding military colleges of Ukraine and Canada. RMC as well as my alma mater have a rich history and strong academic background. However, I tried to pay attention to the details of everyday life at RMC. I found many similarities in both institutions considering accommodations and the variety of programs offered. I also learned that RMC is the historical birthplace of the Canadian flag, and is located near a famous Fort on Lake Ontario. RMC has many laboratories, training facilities and even a nuclear reactor. I only wish we had the same facilities which the students and cadets of RMC have. I was surprised by the high standards of admission to RMC and the studies regimen. "I am not surprised by the reputation of Canadian military units. They are among the strongest in the world and have their troops in the most challenging area of Afghanistan. These thoughts crossed my mind as I walked out the front gates of the College.

This visit inspired me to continue to study military reforms for Ukraine. For those who are interested I brought good news: RMC has a civilian graduate studies program open to international students which can be combined with graduate studies at Queen's University. Remember it can be a great opportunity. Hope it can be mine!

Royal Military College

RMC was established in 1874 "for the purpose of providing a complete education in all branches of military tactics, fortification, engineering, and general scientific knowledge in subjects connected with and necessary to thorough knowledge of the military profession. In 1878, Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, granted the College the right to use the prefix "Royal."

"The Royal Military College of Canada Degrees Act, 1959," passed by the 25th Ontario Legislature and given Royal Assent on March 26, 1959, empowers the College to confer degrees in Arts, Science, and Engineering. RMC now offers a wide variety of programmes in these three areas, at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

The graduates of RMC have established a reputation of service and achievement throughout the world out of all proportion to their numbers.

Lviv Military Institute

History of Lviv Military Institute began in 1899. When in 1991 Ukraine gained its independence and formed its own Armed Forces a new page in the history of Lviv Military Institute began.

This military Institute was the first in Ukraine to combine the systems of civil and military education, namely with Lviv Polytechnic University. Cooperation with the leading civil institutions made it possible for graduates to gain both military and civil professions. It became the guarantee of training highly qualified military staff.

In accordance with the state concepts for a reformed Ukrainian Armed Forces, the guestion of founding a single educational establishment of higher learning for the training of specialists was resolved. Many factors made up the criteria for the framework of the Commission of the Ukrainian Ministry of Defense which laid the foundation for the establishment of the Lviv Military Institute as a basic unit of an institution of higher learning of the Ukrainian Armed Forces.



During my exchange program in the USA, I witnessed an interesting incident. My American friend, who was in his mid-forties, before proceeding to give me a ride, got out of his car and proceeded to the back where he bent down and wiped away the dirt from his only sticker... At first I thought it was a sticker which was required by law to be clearly visible on all vehicles. But when he wiped it clean, I realized that it said "Proud alumnus of Western Washington University". Back then I could not understand why this sticker was important for a person who graduated from University some twenty years ago

...Looking at the small pin on the lapel of my jacket, I comprehend the significance and pride which I associate with the unique program which 20 Ukrainian students completed in Canada in the Fall of 2007.

This small pin does not contain any words whatsoever. Yet it describes succinctly what we witnessed during the Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Program: the gothic style building of parliament in Ottawa, the national symbols of the maple leaf and trident, and three young persons on the foreground. The three students in the foreground resemble the students of past centuries who studied in the historic centres of learning in Mohylanka, Ostroh, Lviv, Lutsk, Odesa, Kharkiv and many other centres of my homeland. And so the representations on our pin link together the seat of government of Canada with the youth of the historic and modern centres of learning of Ukraine.

CUPP: PRIDE & AMBITION

For those who have attended the program there is no need to explain the meaning of these symbols, but for those who aspire to the participate in the program and are eager to become one of about 600 graduates of the Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Program I will offer a brief explanation.

Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Program is a program which emerged due to the efforts of the Chair of the Ukrainian Studies Foundation in Toronto and the Ukrainian Diaspora in Canada. Established in 1991, the Program has operated for the past 17 years bringing over 600 highly qualified Ukrainian students to Canada. The students who completed the internship program represent a wide variety of academic backgrounds including lawyers, historians, economists, mathematicians, linguists and interpreters, journalists, medical doctors. architects and artists and computer science specialists. The geographic span of the program is amazing, covering almost all Ukrainian regions and 64 Universities.

Participants of the CUPP program go through the intensive and exciting internship in the Parliament in Ottawa. Each stu-

Alongside with the duties in the office, each intern receives almost unlimited admission to all of Parliament's events. In past years students immensely enjoyed attending Question Periods, party caucus meetings, Speeches of the Throne, and spontaneous scrums where party leaders including the Prime Ministers and Ministers hold impromptu question and answer scrums. All of these possibilities expose interns to real, first hand experience of Government at work and democracy in action.

Inspired by this parliamentary experience and motivated by informative meetings with outstanding people, interns are motivated to continue their education in the best western Universities. Among the CUPP alumni there are graduates of Oxford, Cambridge, Harvard, Universities of Paris, Amsterdam, Vienna, Berlin, Bonn, Johns Hopkins, Bologna. Milano, Leuven, Toronto, McGill, British Columbia, Western Ontario, Chicago, Queens, UCLA, Brandies and many other prestigious schools.

Looking back at the CUPP experi-

ence, I feel a certain pride in being a part of the program. At the same time, I look forward to closer cooperation of all alumni who share an association with the program. The areas of cooperation are vast and hide huge potential. Among the most promising is the initiative to share academic resources among CUPP Alumni who collectively have access to hundreds of libraries, study centers and archives across Ukraine, Europe and North America.

Considering the profiles of the graduates who are currently working in leading academic, business and government institutions it makes sense to share their expertise and foster communication with those alumni who have recently started their professional careers or are on their way of choosing the career.

In terms of social work, the CUPP community is a perfect environment for implementing projects on a regional or national scale. CUPP is a great network of committed and active young people who can effectively manage the projects.

And last but not least is the joint

work of CUPP alumni community on the newsletter. In responsible business world there is the principle that once the standard is established, there is no way it can be lowered. I do hope that the standard of 56-page newsletter offered by the CUPP 2007 alumni will never be lowered and only improved.

I do wish that the small pin on our jackets continues to symbolize and represent the large community of like-minded people and effective cooperation of those of us who want to make a difference in our homeland and beyond. ■

"This year marks the 75th anniversary of the Holodomor- the Great Famine in Ukraine. Can the Prime Minister share with the House the initiative Canada has taken to commemorate the millions of lives lost in this tragedy?" – James Bezan, MP (Question Period, October 31, 2007)

Participating in CUPP 07, I was delighted to meet Canadians with Ukrainian roots. This experience was one of the most interesting aspects of the program. One such individual was My CUPP'06 MP James Bezan from Selkirk Manitoba, who was kind to host me as an intern. I felt proud of my roots, like never before, when I learned that my MP was of Ukrainian ancestry. In Canada there are over a million Canadians who claim Ukrainian roots and it is therefore not surprising that they have made such important contributions to Canada- Ukraine relations.

Bill C-459, published in the 2nd Edition of the CUPP 2007 Newsletter, was a Private Member's bill that Mr. Bezan tabled in the House of Commons to attempt to have the government of Canada officially recognize the Holodomor as the act of Genocide.

We should be proud of Ukrainian Canadians who act in defense of our nation. Here is my short interview with My MP.

Alla Myshalova: This is your second term as MP in the House of Commons. What is the most exciting aspect in your job? James Bezan: I love working in the House of Commons. I enjoy participating in debates and all of the work we deal with. I am often quite amazed that I am even here. I used to visit this place a lot. I used to come here occasionally some 10 or 15 years ago. I actually had a dream that I would someday be here. So, I do a lot to work in the House and this is one of my favorite places in the world.

A.M.: Would you recommend to others to try their hand at politics? J.B.: Yes. I think, this is the area that can be quite rewarding. It is challenging. You have to expect and accept criticism. But for those who want to make a difference and those who want to participate in the democratic process whether it is at the municipal, provincial or federal level, it can be quite a rewarding job. You can make an impact on people's lives and you can make help make important changes.

A.M.: How do you estimate the role of the youth in politics?

J.B.: I estimate it as quite high. When I look at the future, I look at my kids, at the youth in our schools, and I look at you, Alla. You are our future. You are the future of our world. You know, you will be making decisions in the future that are going to affect me, as I will be a senior. So, I spend a lot of time speaking to school and university students. I encourage them to be responsible young adults and to consider that as they mature and start their careers; they are actually becoming tomorrow's leaders. And they will be moving into positions of power. I mean not only into the political process, but into corporations, businesses and farms, and they will make an impact in all these areas in the course of time. They are going to move Canada forward into the global community.

A.M.: What is your attitude towards Ukrainian youth? Is it different from Canadian youth? J.B.: Because of the CUPP Program, I have a pretty good appreciation for Ukrainian youth. I see them much the same as Canadian youth. You, young people, have so much to look forward to. Things have changed so dramatically over the past 20 years in Ukraine. You have your independence now. I can see that you are more excited about your future. Youth is becoming more active in your country. And it is up to you to demand changes which will lead to greater prosperity and democracy. So I think that you must be excited about Ukraine and all the potential that awaits Ukraine. I see our youth here and youth in Ukraine working closely together in the future.

A.M.: What is you attitude to the presence of Ukrainian Interns/ambassadors in your office?

J.B.: My grandfather was from Ukraine. I try to cooperate with the Ukrainian community in Canada closely. And I am always interested in events which take place in Ukraine. Ukraine is close to my heart and it will always be So taking an intern from so. Ukraine is just a pleasure for me. And as I said CUPP is a great program and it's definitely helpful to me. Work that interns have brought to my office has been helpful in preparing policy and development. I hope that the experience which interns get in my office will be rewarding and helpful to them when they return home.

Early on the morning of Thanksgiving Week-end of 2007 twenty enthusiastic Ukrainian Parliamentary Interns, prepared for a trip to Montreal, McGill University, the 1967 World's Fair Island, museums, and Radio International Canada Headquarters in Montreal. As we left Ottawa for our two hour ride in a yellow school bus, we were given some introductory information by our co-ordinators Andriy and Olya about a fabulous European city in Canada, or the closest in Canada to one of ours!

The ride took less time than we expected and in our eagerness to see the French capital of Canada, we forgot about time. Suddenly we were in another country. While still in Canada we passed by narrow cozy streets, marvelous architecture, beautiful parks and squares and it all looked so much more familiar to us. Truly a European city like one of ours. While driving along Sherbrook Street to our hostel named appropriately Hotel de Paris, a little store called Holts caught my eye. Some of us thought it would be nice to window shop in that area!

But, our first stop was the building of Radio Canada International on Boulevard Rene Levesque, a hero to the Ouebecois who want their own identity ... Our host and interviewer Luba Demko greeted us and conducted an interview with eight of us for the program "Visti z Ukrayiny". We were selected to represent eight regions of Ukraine. During the interviews we enthusiastically shared our opinions and fresh impressions about our work in the Canadian Parliament, the number of outstanding personalities we met, our experiences with the Canadian political system, our visits to Canadian universities and conferences and our exploration of Canada and its diversity.

Following the interviews we were given a tour of the radio and television studios. There were facilities which monitored up to date news from around the world.

Finally at the end of the day, tired and frozen we entered the campus of McGill University one of Canada's best institutions of higher learning. The campus was large and impressive yet retained a cozy atmosphere with age-old buildings and lots of ivy. The presence of cheerful students scurrying about with loads of books reminded us that we were on a university campus in the middle of a large cosmopolitan city.

Our evening program brought us some cardinally different emotions, feelings and thoughts. Artem Luhovyy, McGill student of Ukrainian origin screened two documentary films for us, produced by his father. The first one was dedicated to the issue of the pacification of Ukrainian peasants by the Poles in 1920-1930. The second one was about the famine in Ukraine of 1932-1933. In a few brief moments all the tragedy of Ukrainian history surfaced before our eyes. There was despair and pain, massacre and cruelty, determination of one group of human beings to erase another group of human-beings... We had mixed and confusing feelings to view the documentary films, dedicated to the tragedies experienced by

Ukrainians, while being in Canada, in Montreal. It seemed like this world no longer has any barriers or borders. And indeed, a disaster experienced by one nation is the pain of the whole of mankind. Man's inhumanity casts a shadow on the history of the World, forever.

Our first day in the heart of Quebec was brought to a conclusion. It began in sunny weather and cheerfulness and ended with an aching pain somewhere deep in our souls. The day brought a mixture of contradictory feelings and thoughts. It made us smile and cry, but made us feel very much alive. That one day was so diverse something like Canada itself. And so unpredictable, yet very much true to life. It was a taste of reality where happiness and sorrow commingle so closely with each other, and for us an opportunity to learn from both of these emotions and experiences.

That day ended. But it gave the birth to something really deep and meaningful in everyone of us. These seeds will continue to grow. They will germinate and be cultivated in fertile soil. And they will make a change... ■

Should Ukraine pursue a Resolution at the United Nations concerning the Ukrainian Genocide/Famine?

Ukraine has a sad history of 1932-33. Recently more and more researches and speeches devoted to this topic are made. But still there's no one universal opinion about this issue.

I would wish we could at once sit all together and decide what actually the truth about Holodomor and Holocaust is, but now we are just having a neverending discussion with lots of opinions and interpretations of this topic.

Like the Nazi regime was recognized to be a negative phenomenon and there's no other point of view in the whole world, the same I believe should be with the issue of Holodomor, otherwise it is becoming the point of discussion in politics, international relations, social life.

Our government not just once, but rather frequently is arousing this problem to manipulate their constituency.

There was once even an attempt to create a law proclaiming Holodomor the Genocide and introduce penalty for speaking out loud any different opinion. The original version of the law failed, but at least the fact of the Genocide was recognized. Now Yushchenko is trying to repeat his attempts to return back into the Parliament the original version of law. And no one knows what happens.

I believe the problem of Holodomor should be pursued abroad, where it is only possible. So that our deputies felt control

and misunderstanding from the outside and were encouraged by the world's position to at last proclaim the official governmental point of view on this topic as soon as possible. So that there would be no white points in history.

I took part in the conference devoted to Genocide here in Canada and was surprised to get to know that Canadians are interested in Ukrainian history, carrying out researches, trying to find out the truth. Why do we then are not able to do it?

I will now provide a short prehistory of how the issue of Holodomor was discussed on the governmental level in Canada. (Links provide the access to the information).

The second step for Ukraine to take in order to become a functioning developed state is make changes to the provincial/oblast and municipal laws and structures in the country. Like Canadian provinces our Oblasts have to be more independent from the central government. Powers to these should be wisely de-centralized and the Canadian models could serve us well. Many political systems throughout the world have proved the benefits of the delegation of regional or municipal responsibilities to regional and municipal authorities.

The third issue for Ukraine to resolve is membership in NATO and the European Union (EU). Joining both bodies can only help Ukraine to build strong and powerful state and to improve the living standards in the country, in the foreseeable future. The experience of recent EU and NATO members Poland and the Czech Republic, clearly demonstrate the benefits and the necessity of such participation. Among the benefits are; Growth of the economy; Growth of investments in the country and Increase in the Export/Import areas. Joining the World Trade Organization was another step in the right direction.

What Ukrainians should adopt from Canadians, is the Canadians respect for the rule of law. All that Canadians do they do in compliance with the laws of the land. They try to avoid littering the land with cigarette leftovers in the street. They mostly observe and drive according to the rules of the road. They do not take or expect bribes. As a result Canadian cities are clean and green. There are few traffic blockages or grid-lock on the streets (unlike in Ukraine) and the crime level in Canada is comparatively low. I do admit that there is the usual rush hour traffic but this is expected and predictable and relatively brief.

We can change our political ideology, we can amend our laws,

we can publish uncensored newspapers or magazines, we can also develop partnerships with other countries, and we can declare democratic principles. But we cannot achieve the results we need without a change in our mind-set or our mentality! If we Ukrainians do not want to live in harmony and order, and change our mind-set or mentality, no amount of changes or declarations will help us. The solutions are in our hands!

After CUPP my goal is to apply my Canadian experience in my homeland. One small step at a time. I want to live better and I hope my children will live better in a Future Ukraine!

Third Annual Danyliw Research Seminar in Contemporary Ukrainian Studies at the University of Ottawa

On October, 13, 2007 our CUPP group was lucky to take part in the Annual Research Seminar in Contemporary Ukrainian Studies. It is inspiring that professors and scientists in Canada are carrying on research on issues so important for our country.

Unfortunately we were late for the first day of the conference but took an active part at soon as we were able to join the Seminar.

There were two sessions and five topics dealing with World War II and its Soviet interpretation of the so-called *Great Patriotic War* and the politics of genocide in Ukraine.

It was interesting to listen to the professional opinions of serious Canadian researchers on how they interpret historical events in Ukraine and contemporary Ukrainian politics. They give you an outside opinion, yet from the point of view of some whose ancestral roots lie in Ukraine.

But on the other hand, I per-

sonally came to the conclusion that it is hard and almost impossible to be an expert about a country you have never visited. It was quite clear which of the speakers who gave reports, had ever visited Ukraine or Belarus.

The seminar was organized in the following way; the first Speaker presented his/her paper. Following the presentation a Discussant had the opportunity to put forth contradictory positions and facts, and then there followed a discussion.

Seminar participants were also given an opportunity to join in the discussion.

This method of dealing with a topic can be quite contentious as topics can have many sides, and there can be many disagreements among the discussants. I should note that most of the Topics and discussions were based on already published articles or texts by prominent authors and researchers.

I felt that for me this was not

enough. Certainly there were some well researched papers presented at the Seminar, but you cannot fully understand a topic or period of history unless you understand the mentality of the people and the tenor of the times, and the regime in power at the time.

To fully understand and interpret the subject of your study you should try to become involved in that culture and society and learn as much about them and their points of view and interpretations of the subject matter at hand.

It was noticeable during the conference that those scientists who are originally from Ukraine, or have lived there, had an advantage over those who did not. Because it is inside them – I mean the understanding of the situation is inside them. Let me give you an example. There were so many arguments about the notion of the *Great Patriotic War*. Canadians find it hard to understand why it was called like that. Why patriot-



ic?! We cannot accept it as well, but we can understand it because we have lived in this environment where stress is placed on great *patriotism*.

I would also like to touch another topic discussed during the conference. Canadians don't understand why Ukrainian cannot finally all agree as to whether the Holodomor was Genocide or not, as well as other issues such as whether Ukraine should join NATO, or whether there should be one or two official languages. I believe this is not only about politics or winning extra-votes. I claim most of the politicians (like the Party of Regions, Socialists) do not even have a clear vision on what they are going to do with this country they rule. And this is quite sad. Until we all know who we are and what we want to be, and what it means – to be Ukrainian, it will be hard not to come to consensus on these questions.

I am glad I had a chance to be present at this conference. I wish there was more cooperation between foreign countries and Ukraine – so that foreign countries could learn more about the present situation in our country and learn our view on the changes taking place, and we from our side could use the international experience, to rely on the support of prominent politicians, scientists, elite, cultural leaders, to get to the truth or to consensus..

The conference allowed us to meet interesting speakers such as Serbyn Roman from the University of Quebec, Wsevolod Isajiw from the University of Toronto and CUPP Alumni as well as many representatives of the Ukrainian Diaspora. It was a worthwhile experience. I should mention that our group was accepted really warmly, our Newsletters were extremely popular and we were very welcome to take part in the discussions (both formal and informal). And I am happy we contributed to the Seminar.

The Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Program is an outstanding opportunity for a student from Ukraine, to make an individual contribution as well as to benefit from participation in CUPP, into both Canadian and Ukrainian societies.

There is no doubt that CUPP provides unique opportunities to CUPP interns to observe the operation of a western Parliament, to become acquainted with the life of the Ukrainian community in Canada, and to get an overview of a civil society through communicating with Canadians.

To begin with, our daily parliamentary duties consisted of office work, communications with our MPs and their assistants, attendance at Question Periods, the speech from the Throne, press-conferences, etc. We should say that all of these activities were very important for us, since through them we were able to understand the essence of the Canadian political system.

During office hours we became acquainted with important communications issues such as the person-oriented approach by the MP to each Canadian citizen who appeals to the MP, with the most frequent responsibilities of the MP and their assistances and how well-informed the MP's have to be able to conduct their daily activities. We were deeply impressed with Canadian MPs' attitude to their electors' appeals and propositions, in that every appeal was answered expeditiously, and, that the voice of each Canadian is heard in parliament through their elected representatives – their Members of Parliament. It does not depend on your ethnicity or your place of birth, your voice is heard by your MP and government.

Another important observation for us was how Canadians managed to preserve their cultural parliamentary heritage, which is the manner of communicating to each other in the parliament. These communications included established traditions of challenging the statements by the governing party the Conservatives, and the sometimes sharp retorts of the loyal opposition the Liberals, the supporting applauses, the desk thumping, and the periodic heckling by the opposition aimed at specific Ministers, all carried out without any great hint of disrespect or apparent malice.

The opening session of Parliament incorporated the ceremonial speech from the Throne by the Governor-General and other parliamentary traditions... Canada incorporates the features of royalty, with the impressive parliamentary ceremonies, and speeches.

Secondly, as mentioned before CUPP'07 gave us a splendid opportunity to get acquainted with Ukrainian community in Canada with our own eyes, to feel spirit of Ukraine and the Ukrainian traditions in Canada. All these gave us an assumption that Ukraine and the essence of Ukrainian spirit should be studied not in Ukraine, but here, in Canada, where the representatives of Ukrainian community were not influenced by those destructive factors that people in Ukraine experienced, and consequently, managed to preserve all the best Ukrainian traditions inside their Ukrainian community in Canada and, moreover, to calculate love and respect to those values of other communities residing on the territory of this most tolerant and multicultural country in the world.

Also we had a wonderful opportunity to become acquainted with Ukrainians who occupy different social positions in the main stream Canadian community. The most impressive thing about it was that notwithstanding social position and level of personal welfare, Canadian Ukrainians have not only integrated into mainstream Canada, but successfully promote Ukrainian culture, language, moral values etc. and try to help Ukraine as much as possible. Another interesting point was that some Ukrainians were so sick at heart about their homeland that they tried to extend our meetings as long as possible in order to make us feel as much at home. And...looking into the eyes of those people we felt such warmth, sincerity, frankness, and parental dedicationIt's very difficult to express these feelings in words and the only way to experience it is just to come to Canada and to experience it. You know, after the moments like these whether you want or not, you start loving your homeland more and more and there appears a sort of desire to act and to do your best to improve the situation in your homeland, to better the life of your nation... Those who were in Canada and met Ukrainian Diaspora would understand it, and those who have not...just sorry...By the way, 'Sorry', 'Pardon', 'Excuse me' are the most popular words in Canada and that is another proof how polite, cultural, sophisticated are Canadians and Ukrainian Canadians in particular.

During our stay in Canada we were honored to be hosted by different families and individuals and as a result we had a wonderful opportunity to experience the unity of Ukrainians in Canada. These Exchanges gave us a wonderful answer as to how Canadian Ukrainians could achieve such considerable results in terms of their business activities, political careers etc. Throughout all the time of their residence in Canada they helped each other and other Ukrainians, who immigrated to Canada: they sheltered each other, helped to find jobs or employed etc. These attributes are preserved to the present day. ...This was our experience in Canada. Due to this program we gained a lot of wonderful, priceless lessons. It seems to us that we gained our MBA in Contemporary Life Studies during our staying in Canada. However, the main thing for us is that we are coming back home better than when we arrived.

Студенти почали розповідати про щойно завершену Канадсько-Українську Парламентську Програму:

Дмитро: "Насправді ця програма - дуже широки проєкт, з надзвичайно широкими цілями. Тому кожна людина ставить перед собою свої певні цілі, свої певні завдання. Щодо мене, я вважаю що я виніс величезний і життєвий і практичний досвід з цієї програми. Мені навіть важно зупинитись на певній конкретній галузі через те, що це було й спілкування з різними культурними меншинами, і спілкування з депутатами, і відвідання парламентських сесій. і відвідання музеїв в Канаді. Оксана: Я б навіть сказала, що мої сподівання навіть перевиконалися, тому що спочатку я думала, що це буде тільки там познайомитись з країною, побачити як працює Парламент, порівняти з українським Парламентом (бо я була інтерном в нашій Верховній Раді), познайомитися з новими людьми. А тут виявилося, що це просто такий дуже унікальний досвід, тому що я зустріла велику, дуже згруповану українську громаду тут, яка дуже нам забагатила наше тут перебування. Я також побачили різні аспекти роботи в Парламенті, починаючи від роботи в офісі члена Парламенту, закінчуючи *question periods*, і інші зібрання.

Ведуча: Це "період запитань" коли депутати ставлять один одному запитання...

Оксана: Тобто це було дуже, дуже, дуже цікаво і я думаю що я візьму дуже багато корисного з собою назад в Україну. Найголовніше, що б я вводила, це саме доступність Парламенту й влади до громадян.

Февзій: Мої сподівання виправдалися на всі 100%. Ціллю програми... є познайомитися з Канадою як державою, з системою канадською, з тим, що її репрезентує. Тобто, стажування в Парламенті, наприклад, прогулянка по вулиці, спілкування з пересічними громадянами, спілкування в публічному транспорті, це все дає змогу зрозуміти, що є Канада як держава, що є канадієць, як громадянин цієї держави.

Діана: ...мої сподівання вони просто пере-, пере... ну перевершили план, я не знаю скільки разів. Але важко зараз виразити всі свої почуття, емоції, враження, натхнення, яке ми тут здобули. Бо кожна людина, яку ми зустріли, починаючим від представників діяспори, закінчуючи парламентаріями, спікерами, політиками, кожен з них дав нам часточку своєї мудрості, свого вміння, свого досвіду. І - я б сказала найголовніше: доброго побажання, доброї надії в Україну, в її майбутнє. І все те ми зараз з такою великою впевненістю, вірою несемо додому. Я ще ніколи не відчувала такого натхнення, віри в наші молоді сили і в те, що абсолютно все можливо.

Ведуча: Що Вас саме надихнуло, що Вам дало цю віру?

Діана: ...Це комплекс, але мабуть почалося з того, як нас зустріла діаспора. Вони дійсно дивилися і дивляться на нас як (на) майбутніх лідерів. І це їхнє сподівання воно також доповнилося тим, що ми почули від парламентарів, що Україна має унікальний шанс саме зараз, в такий історичний момент, переломний, просто дійсно зрушити все з мертвої точки. ...Це насправді вже давно почалося. Тому... Все тільки попереду, все тільки починається.

Ведуча: Я бачу, що Оксана щось пише й хоче доповнити...

Оксана: Так, я б хотіла сказати, що в нас вірять дуже багато людей і ми просто не маємо морального ...права підвести їх. Всі в нас вірять. В нас вірять українська діаспора, в нас вірять люди в Україні, в нас вірять наші батьки. І ми маємо Дмитро: Хто буде це робити, як не ми? І підтримую Діану за діаспору. Як я помітив зі свого досвіду, для них просто честь бути з нами. Так само для нас честь бути з ними. І це так взагалі єднає, І їхня віра... Вони заражають своєю вірою нас на майбутні звершення.

Ведуча: Оксана сказала, що стажувалася у Верховній Раді. Чи Ви всі відвідували Верховну Раду в Києві?

Діана: Я була на екскурсії у Верховній Раді, але, на жаль, не мала змоги там попрацювати.

Дмитро: На жаль ні, не вдалося. Досить приклад такий яскравий, що в канадському Парламенті легше працювати, стажуватися, ніж в українському.

Ведуча: А Ви по телебаченні, принаймні, мали нагоду спостерігати, як працює Верховна Рада, правда?

Дмитро: Так, в нас по телебаченні...

Ведуча: Якщо порівняти канадський...

Февзій: Якщо порівняти канадський і український досвід. Так. Засідання Верховної Ради i Question periods канадського парламенту. Question periods канадського Парламенту власне й репрезентує оцей канадський Парламент, або House of Commons. I це ϵ , можливо, найважливіша процедура роботи Парламенту, і найважливіша його функція. Коли опозиція має змогу задати питання і вона 100% впевнена в тому, що на це питання буде дана відповідь. Позитивна або негативна, але вона буде дана тим урядом. То є дуже важко за ці пів хвилини, протягом яких ...ставиться це питання підготувати відповідь і дати на це запитання відповідь. Запитання, яке мав змогу спостерігати, воно з різних галузей. Політичного, економічного, культурного життя Канади. І те, що пов'язано з роботою уряду або Парламенту... і які ставляться до уряду. І уряд має на них відповідати. Якщо ми матимемо подібну практику в Україні, я думаю, як наслідок ми матимемо набагато практичніший уряд і набагато відповідальніших політиків.

Діана: Я б хотіла, дійсно, підтримати Февзія. І за ці п'ять тижнів роботи в Парламенті в мене вже визріло таке чітке бачення того, що ми дійсно можемо взяти, який досвід ми можемо запозичити з роботи канадського Парламенту.

Ведуча: А саме?

Діана: По-перше: це, як вже сказала Оксана, відкритість Парламенту. Доступність парламентарів самого Парламенту, самого процесу демократичного, всім людям, всім громадянам. I, я думаю, найважливіше це... відповідальність членів Парламенту, які представляють народ, перед своїми виборцями. Тобто, вони постійно їздять до своїх виборчих округів, вони спілкуються з громадянами. Громадяни надсилають їм листи і вони зобов'язані на них відповісти. І знову ж таки підтримую Февзія в тому, що нам потрібна ця система, коли є правлячий уряд і є дійсна, міцна, реальна опозиція, яка запитує з цього правлячого уряду, що він робить, і для чого.

Ведуча: Може, Дмитре, Ви...

Дмитро: Досить цікава система Парламенту взагалі, запозичена в (Велико)Британії. Тут в нас в Канаді. У Вас... (колеги сміються)... Вже рідною країною стала теж, другим домом. Те що, наприклад, є Нижня палата Парламенту і Верхня палата Парламенту. Це свого роду "double check", подвійна, якби, перевірка законів, законопроєктів, які подаються в Парламенті. Як не говорю, що наприклад, в нас має бути Сенат і Нижня і Верхня палата Парламенту. Але ми могли б мати такі свого роду подвійні перевірки на випадок того, що хтось помилиться, чи хтось поступить в своїх інтересах, не в інтересах народу.

Оксана: А я також хотіла підкреслити, що я була дуже вражена тим, наскільки члени Парламенту тут в Канаді працюють зі своєю громадою. Тобто, вони постійно контактують. Тобто, це не є проблема зателефонувати, або написати, і ти завжди отримаєш ту відповідь.

В Україні зараз працює система, що в нас вибирають депутатів за списками. Тобто, це не кожен депутат, який закріплений за своїм округом, або "riding", as in Canada, а ми маємо тільки список. І то він не повний. Він тільки включає перших десять лідерів. Тобто - це політики, це люди, які просто себе "піарять", але то не є люди, які допомагають народу. Також я помітила, що тут у членів Парламенту менше привілеїв. Вони нарівні з звичайними громадянами. Ми теж маємо це ввести в Україні...

Діана: А я хотіла б додати, що незважаючи на те, що зараз ліберали в опозиції, а я працювала в офісі ліберала... Я помітила, що... ті, хто зараз в опоиції, не при владі, стараються ще більше, щоб під час наступних виборів саме були обрані вони. Тому тут відбувається таке постйне змагання за виборців. Це не просто змагання, це, я ...хочу вірити, що це дійсно бажання служити людям. Ну, і відповідно вже, змагання політичне, як наступний чинник.

Ведуча: Ви, шановне товариство, працювали з депутатами всіх партій у Парламенті. Тобто: Ліберали, правляча Консервативна й Нова Демократична Партія (окрім Квебецького Блоку). Які ваші спостереження щодо співжиття, міжпартійне співжиття...

Февзій: Ну, якщо навіть назви партій, лідери й харизматичність їх і, певно, принципи партії вони різняться між собою. Водночас, немає певної ідеологічної різниці, або різниці принципіальної, або тих кардинальних поглядів, які б партії мали щодо того та іншого питання...

Дмитро: ...дуже оригінальні в них стосунки, між партіями.

Февзій: В роботі самого Парламенту, або в роботі опозиції і уряду... ще таке цікаве дуже спостереження. Разом із цією поведінкою, яка видається нам незвичайною. тобто вставання. хлопання, хлопотання ногами під столом, або викрикування з місця, разом із цією поведінкою, яка напевно має початок з традиції. І ця традиція накладається на модель сьогоднішню, тобто модель національної держави, або держави, де принципи демократії і прав людини є ідеалом і принципи, можливо, етичної поведінки. Тобто, вони звертаються, говорячи один до одного, вони звертаються до Спікера Парламенту, тобто "Mister Speaker". Говориячи один про одного, до "Містера Спікера", вони говорять "Honorable member of Par*liament*". Тобто, є певна етика поведінки, напевно. І це дуже, дуже цікаво.

Діана: Я б хотіла додати що я. на відміну, наприклад, від Февзія, все таки побачила відмінності між партіями, наприклад, Консерваторами й Лібералами. Ну, зокрема, ми мали змогу відвідати семінар, присвячений "drug policy", тобто проблемам СНІДу, наркотиків. I ми відчули дійсно чітку різницю між позиціями правлячої партії і опозиційної. Ну, відповідно, опозиційна партія вона підтримує те, щоби, зокрема, держава переймалася проблемами тих людей, наприклад, які вживають наркотики, щоб це було безпечно для оточуючих, для суспільства. В той час, як консерватори, наприклад, вважають, що потрібно таких людей лікувати, ізолювати, і таке інше. Тобто, кардинальний підхід. Тобто, все таки Ліберали вони є ліберали, а консерватори лишаються консерваторами. Думаю, це принципова різниця.

Оксана: Я ще хотіла сказати, що вони... в дуже багатьох питаннях різняться. Але не може бути країни, в якої буде або Консервативна, або Ліберальна партія, бо це приведе до хаосу. Вони повинні доповнювати один одного, як плюс і мінус, як *positive i negative*. Тобто, як не кажу, що якась з них позитивна, а одна негативна. Але то просто має бути такий комплексний підхід до вирішення всіх проблем держави.

Ведуча: Якби Ви стали прем'єр-міністром, що Ви би в Україні вже ввели, негайно, з канадського досвіду?

Діана: Це напевно вже те, що я згадувала. По-перше, це змінити систему, за якою обираються народні депутати до Верховної Ради. Тобто, щоби кожен депутат обирався від окремого округу і звітував перед своїми виборцями. Тобто відповідальність перед виборцями. А також, я все таки сподіваюся, що буде прийнятий в Україні закон про опозицію, який буде чітко визначати її права, обов'язки й таке інше.

Оксана: Я б зробила владу, уряд і Парламент, більш відкритою до громадян. Тобто, не просто це показувати по телебаченню, а щоб люди могли приходити й слухати, що говорять люди, за яких вони голосували.

Дмитро: Я хотів би звернути увагу на два аспекти. Перший, це поняття рівності перед законом, який, на мою думку, дуже гарно втілюється в Канаді. Я не знаю, якими методами ще цього добитися... Чи змінити дещо психологію, чи якимось чином відношення до людей в Україні з боку влади, щоб дійсно всі люди, і політики й прості мешканців, були рівні перед законом.

А другий аспект: В Канаді досить ефективно представлена система провінційного самоврядування. У нас в Україні, саме актуальна тема - нема визначеного місцевого самоврядування, меж місцевого впливу влади. І тому, я думаю, це першочергове завдання - потрібно вирішити владу на локальному рівні в Україні, використовуючи корисний досвід зза океану.

Февзій: Якби я був прем'єр-міністром, по-перше, би звернув більшу увагу на етнічний, або культурний, чинник, який теж має дуже важливу роль. І культурні або ментальні особливості. Те, що добре тут, воно може бути недобре там. Але певним чином я би хотів пролобіювати процес "question periods". І, звичайно, обрання депутатів за мажоритарною системою. Ведуча: Коли Ви повернетеся в Україну, що Ви скажете (якщо одним реченням), що таке Канада?

Оксана: Канада це мультикультурна країна, з багатим досвідом, як зі сторони Англії, так зі сторони Франції. Це унікальна країна, в якої треба брати приклад.

Дмитро: Канада це громадянське суспільство з репрезентативною демократією.

Февзій: Трьома словами я спробую. Канада або канадієць це чемність, відкритість, толерантність.

Діана: Насправді, Канада це відкрите суспільство, це щирість, і це краса.

Ведуча: Дехто з Вас брав участь у Генеральній Асамблеї Асоціяції Атлантичного Договору. І дехто з Вас відвідував Кінґстон. Може, коротко про це?

Дмитро: Згадана була перша Асоціяція. Це проводилась міжнародна конференція серед як і старших так і молодших лідерів цієї Атлантичної Ради. Там обговорювались питання, зокрема ті, що стосуються військ Канади в Афганістані, що стосується загальної позиції НАТО стосовно країн, що збираються вступити, стосовно цих членів що вже зараз є в НАТО. І перспективи й плани розвитку, таким чином.

Ведуча: Тобто, була також мова про Україну? Коли вона приєднається...

Дмитро: Так, частково зачіпали цю тему, але... Там приїжджав міністер закордонних справ Росії, то там увага була зосереджена на Росії в основному, теж.

Февзій: Мені здається, що то був помічник міністра закор-

донних справ. ...Це проходило на дуже високому рівні. Звичайно, головною темою був Афганістан та розширення НАТО. В тому числі й України. Можливо, досягненням української делегації на Асамблеї є те, що Асамблея в 2009 р. проводитиметься в Києві. І напевно Київ, або Україна матиме певні вигоди з такої визначної події.

Ведуча: Кінґстон, Військовий коледж...

Оксана: Нас було троє …в Кінґстоні. Ми мали зустрічі в Королівському військовому коледжі. Також, дякуючи проф. Любомиру Луцюку в нас була дуже, просто надзвичайна, культурна програма. Ми побачили ті історичні місця, які багато значать для українців. Саме Форт Генрі, там де було інтернування українців. Тобто, була дуже, дуже корисна поїздка.

Ведуча: На Вас розраховують у Канаді, в Україні. Ви - майбутнє. В політику збираєтеся?

Діана: Це провокаційне запитання. (сміються). У нас, до речі, були такі внутрішні анкети між собою. І одне з останніх запитань було: "Чи бажаєте Ви стати президентом України?" Більшість відповіла, що "Звичайно". Але насправді я вважаю, щоб робити щось, починати треба з малого. Тобто, крок за кроком. І, неодмінно, коли ти робиш зміни на мікрорівні, вони, безумовно, зроблять свій вплив і на всю країну в цілому.

Оксана: Тобто, на кожному рівні на якому ми будемо стояти, не обов'язково президент чи прем'єр, ми маємо робити якнайкраще. Тобто, робити свою роботу й іти далі...

Ведуча: ...починати від себе,

від свого оточення.

Оксана: ...так, так.

Февзій: Є такий вислій цікавий: "думай глобально, дій локально". Тобто, якщо говорити, чи підете ви в політику, треба розібратись, що таке політика. Якщо це певне досягнення інтересів у певному процесі соціальної взаємодії, то звичайно, якщо людина має певний інтерес, вона знає хто вона, і що вона хоче досягти, вона на підсвідомому, на певному свідомому рівні із власним переконанням вже в політиці.

Дмитро: А в нас в Україні говорять, якщо ти не шукаєш політику, то політика знайде тебе... (сміх, усі погоджуються). I знову ж таки, пошлюся на мого депутата, ...що сказала, щоб іти в політику, потрібна лише зацікавленість в політиці, інтерес і відданість. Тобто, вона вважає, досвіду певного не потрібно. З іншої сторони, ми мали цікаву зустріч з архітектором з Оттави, що розбудовував місто Канату, коло Оттави... То він сказав, що людина повинна бути найкраща на кожному своєму кроці. І тоді, поступово просуваючись вище, людина помаленьку стає чи лідером, чи провідником. I, відповідно, тоді вже можна йти в політику. Але будуть реальні досягнення й реальні, пройдені, ступені.

Ведуча: Щиро дякую, що завітали до нашої студії. Бажаю Вам успіхів у всьому, що Ви робите.

Колективне: Дякую, дякую Вам. Успіхів Вам теж. Щасливо. Всього найкращого.

Інтерв'ю з випускниками Канадсько-Української Парламентської Програми 2007 року на Канадському Міжнародному Радіо

Ведуча Люба Демко (В). Гості Програми: Оксана Клеутіна (ОК); Февзі Амзаєв (ФА); Діана Гладка (ДГ); Дмитро Панчук (ДП).

В: Говорить Канадське Міжнародне Радіо.У передачі «Канада сьогодні» ви познайомитеся, шановні слухачі, із найсвіжішими випускниками Канадсько-Української Парламентської Програми. Ця програма була започаткована в 1991 році на відзначення столітнього ювілею поселення українців у Канаді, а її фундатором і досі незамінним директором є торонтський адвокат Ігор Бардин. Упродовж 16 років парламентський досвід в Оттаві отримали сотні ураїнських студентів. А днями лави випускників збагатилися на ще двадцятьох. На завершення Канадсько-Української Парламентської Програми, як велить неписана традиція, студенти завітали до Монреалю. А я запросила до студії цих четверо випускників. Знайомтесь:

ОК: Мене звати Оксана Клеутіна. Я є родом з Кривого роду, центральної частини України. Але зараз я працюю та навчаюсь у Києві, в Національному Авіаційному Університеті за спеціальністю туризм.

ФА: Мене звати Февзі Амзаєв. Я народився в Узбекистані, але зараз проживаю в Криму. Навчаюся в Києво-Могилянській Академіі за спеціальністю політологія. Працюю в міжнародній громадській організації «Наш Крим». В: Ви також володієте кримсько-татарською мовою, чи не так?

ФА: звичайно, володіти рідною мовою є обов'язок кожної людини, якщо вона знає, хто вона та звідки вона походить.

ДГ: Доброго дня всім! Мене звати Діана Гладка. Я є родом з Полтави, а зараз навчаюся в місті Харків у Національній юридичній академії ім. Ярослава Мудрого, де вивчаю міжнародне право.

ДП: Мене звати Дмитро Панчук. Я родом зі старовинного міста Дубно, про яке колись писав Микола Васильович Гоголь. Навчаюся також у Рівненській області, у Національному університеті Острозька акдемія, вивчаю англійську та французську мови.

В: Ось вони співавтори цієї листівки: Оксана Клеутіна, Февзі Амзаєв, Діана Гладка та Дмитро Панчук. І ми ведемо з ними розмову про щойно завершену ними Канадсько-Українську Парламентську Програму.

ДП: Насправді ця програма є надзвичайно масштабним проектом з грандіозними цілями. Але кожна окрема людина ставить перед собою свої певні завдання. Щодо мене, то я вважаю, що виніс для себе надзвичайно важливий життєвий та практичний досвід з цієї програми. Мені навіть важко зупинитися на певній конкретній галузі стажування, терез те, що це було і спілкування з різними культурними общинами та депутатами, відвідування різноманітних парламетнських сессій та музеїв у Канаді, знайомство з самою країною, і товаришування в групі, врешті решт. Всі ці аспекти допомогли мені значно зрости як особистості за цей місяць.

В: Оксано, що Ви скажете?

ОК: Я б також зауважила, що мої сподівання навіть перевершилися. Адже спочатку я думала, що ця програма спрямована тільки на те, щоб познайомитися з роботою Канадського парламетну, а також порівняти цей досвід з роботою нашого парламетну, оскільки я також була інтерном у Верховній Раді України. А як виявилось, цей досвід є більш комплексним, ніж я могла собі уявляти. В Канаді я зустріла дуже велику, згруповану українську громаду, яка збагатила наше перебування у Канаді. Я також пізнала різні аспекти роботи в парламетні, починаючи від стажування в офісі члена паврламенту та закінчаючи відвіданням Ouestion Periods й інших політичний зібрань. Це було надзвичано цікаво! Я впевнена, що візьму багато корисного досвіду з собою в Україну. А найголовніше, що б я виділила, це доступність влади громадянам. ФА: Мої сподівання від програми виправдалися на всі сто відсотків. Метою програми є познайомитися з Канадою як державою, з канадською системою та тим, що її репрезентує. Сілкування у Парламетні, спілкування з пересічними громадянами, прогулянка містом – все це дає можливість зрозуміити, що являє собою Канада як держава та канадієць як громадянин цієї держави...

ДГ: Це не буде новиною, якщо я скажу, що мої враження від програми перевершили початкові сподівання у невизначену кількість разів. Тому мені зараз важко виразити всі свої емоції, почуття, переживання з цього приводу, описати словами те натхнення, що ми тут здобули. Бо кожна людина, яку ми зустріли під час Програми, починаючи від представників діаспори та закінчуючи парламентарями, спікерами, політиками, дала нам часточку своєї мудрості, вміння, досвіду. А найголовніше, на мою думку, що ми несемо від цих людей додому - це добре побажання Україні, віра в неї, її майбутнє. Я ще ніколи не відчувала такого натхнення, віри у наші молоді сили...віри у те, що абсолючтно все можливо.

В: А що саме Вас надихнуло? Що Вам дало цю віру?

ДГ: Дуже цікаве запитання. Відповідь на нього є комплексною. Але, напевно, почалося все з того, як нас зустріла українська діаспора в Канаді. Вона дійсно сприймає нас як на майбутніх лідерів України. Сила та ефект такого сподівання на нас також підсилилися тим, що ми почули від парламентарів. А саме, вони переконані, що зараз Україна має унікальний шанс зрушити у своєму розвитку з мертового місця. Тому для нас все тільки починається.

ОК: Я б також хотіла доповнити, що, дійсно, у нас вірить надзвичайно велика кількість людей, тому ми не маємо жодного морального права їх підвести. У нас вірить українська діаспора тут у Канаді, звичайні люди в Україні, наші батьки. Тож ми маємо робити все на благо нашої держави.

ДП: Дійсно, хто буде це робити, як не ми? Я б також хотів підтримати думку Діани стосовно діаспори. Я дійсно помітив, що для її представників то є велика честь бути з нами, так само як і нам спілкуватися з ними під час програми. Вони заражають нас своїм оптимізмом та вірою у себе, яка є такою необхідною для наших майбутніх звершень.

В: Що Ви можете сказати на рахунок порівняння досвіду роботи канадського та українського парламетнстів?

 ΦA : На мою думку, question period або період запитань власне й репрезентує канадський парламет та є чи не найважливішою процедурою його роботи. Адже в цей час опозиція має можливість задати питання та є стовідсотково переконаною у тому, що відповідь на це запитання буде надана урядом. Наскільки я спостерігав, уряду ставляться питання з абсолютно різних галузей - економічного, політичного, культурного життя Канади. І насправді, це є нелегке завдання швидко зорієнтуватися та надати гарну вичерпну відповідь ща такий короткий промыжок часу. Для цього потрібно бути дуже обізнаним у тому, чим дійсно живе країна. Якщо ми запровадимо подібну практику в Україні, як наслідок, ми будемо мати більш практичний уряд та значно відповідальніших політиків. **ДГ: Я** б також хотіла підтримати Февзі з цією думкою. За ці 4 тижні стажування у канадському парламенті у мене вже склалася чітке бачення того, що саме ми можемо запозичити з цього досвіду. По перше, це відкритість Парламенту, доступність демократичного процесу всім громадянам. А найголовніше – це відповідальність членів Парламенту перед своїми вибор-ЦЯМИ.

ДП: Дійсно, досить цікава система була запозичена канадійцями у Великобританії. Тобто, у Канаді є дві палати Парламенту: верхня та нижня, що забезпечує свого роду подвійну перевірку законопроектів, що подаються до нього. Це не означає, однак, що в Україні неодмінно необхідно запроваджувати двопалатний парламент, але нам неохідна ця система подвійного конролю на випадок здійснення певних помилок чи поступлення інтересами народу на користь власних пілей.

ОК: Я також була дуже вражена тим, наскільки тісно співпрацюють у Канаді члени парламенту зі своїми виборцями. Нажаль, в Україні ми зараз обираємо депутатів за списками, що унеможливлює прямий доступ кожного окремого виборця до свого обранця. Також я помітила, що канадські депутати мають значно менше привілеїв, ніж народні депутати в Україні. Це ще дві особлтвості канадського досвіду, які я б хотіла запровадити в Україні. В: Оксана працбвала в офісі консерватора Інкі Марка. Оскільки консерватори зараз при владі, вони мають дуже уважно ставитися до своїх виборців. ДГ: Так, але я б хотіла зауважити, що працюючи у офісі представника опозиційної партії Дена МакТега, я помітила наступне: ліберали, у свою чергу, теж намагаються якнайкраще догодити своїм виборцям, щоб під час наступних виборів перемогти та зайняти лідируючі позиції в країні. Тобто завжди відбувається свого роду змагання за виборців, здорова конкуренція. З іншобо боку, я також усвідомлюю, що первинним для політика у цій країні є все таки бажання служити

людям, і вже похідним від нього є змагання за електорат.

В: Завершення розмови з випускниками Канадсько-Української Парламентської Програми Ви зможете почути у наступному випуску листівок з Канади.

ВІДЗНАЧЕНО ПАРЛАМЕНТАРНУ ПРОГРАМУ «КАНАДА-УКРАЇНА»

(ППКУ – Київ). 7 грудня 2007 року надзвичайний і повноважний Посол Канади в Україні Абіна Данн влаштувала урочистий прийом з нагоди 17-ї річниці Парламентарної програми «Канада-Україна» (ППКУ). Понад 150 випускників програми з університетів Луганська, Донецька, Дніпропетровська, Сум, Луцька, Рівного, Чернівців, Івано-Франківська, Ялти, Одеси, а також Брюселя, Варшави, Амстердама та Торонто прибули на при-Були присутні також йом. представники Верховної Ради, Конституційного Суду України та мистецької громади Киє-Ra

У своєму вступному слові Абіна Данн привітала учасників та організаторів Парламентарної програми й зазначила, що вона пишається тим, що Канада виступила з такими визначними ініціативами як визначними ініціативами як визнання незалежності України й створення першої і єдиної освітньої парламентарної програми для студентів університетів України.

Програма «Канада-Україна» була розпочата навесні 1990 року внаслідок угоди між Спікером Парламенту Джоном Фрейзером та Фундацією Катедри Українознавчих Студій в Торонто. Відповідно до угоди, студенти університетів України одержали доступ до Канадського Парламенту і відповідно такі ж можливості, як і студенти двох уже існуючих програм - Канадської парламентарної програми та Парламентарної програми «Канада-США». Навесні 1991 року троє студентів з університетів Києва та Львова прибули на перше стажування, яке надалі відкрило шлях у Канадський Парламент для наступних 600 студентів. За останні 17 років понад 20 тисяч студентів університетів України подавали заяви на участь у програмі.

На прийомі були присутні випускники ППКУ, які сьогодні працюють у представництвах та установах України закордоном, в уряді України, в Секретаріаті Конституційного Суду України, а також випускниця Парламентарної програми 2003 року Еліна Шишкіна, яка першою з її учасників була обрана до Верховної Ради України у 2007 році.

На прийомі було зачитано письмове привітання, яке надійшло від Прем'єр-міністра Канади Стівена Гарпера, у якозокрема зазначалося: MV «Упродовж останніх 17 років участь талановитих студентів українських університетів у цій надзвичайній стажувальній програмі була для Парламенту Канади дуже корисним досвідом. Судячи з досягнень цих студентів та з успішного завершення програми з року в рік, можна твердити, що її учасники є найкращим цвітом і гордістю України. Сподіваюся, що досвід, здобутий у нашому парламенті, допоможе їм у подальших численних і амбітних починаннях».

Депутат Парламенту з Торонто Борис Вжесневський у своєму виступі сказав: «Парламентарна програма «Канада-Україна», започаткована у 1991 році завдяки баченню та провідництву пана Ігоря Бардина, стала однією з найуспішніших студентських стажувальних програм, які працюють у Парламенті Канади. Під керівництвом Ігоря Бардина та завдяки його відданості, стажери ППКУ з найбільших університетів України одержали можливість вивчати роботу Парламенту Канади, знайомитись з його демократичними традиціями і здобувати безпосередній досвід».

Пітер Голдрінг, Депутат Парламенту з Едмонтона, писав: «Я бачив багато молодих людей, які були учасниками програми ППКУ. Протягом ряду років вони були втіленням високих ідеалів у своїх досягненнях та на службі громаді, і є справжніми нинішніми й майбутніми провідниками України».

Президент Товариства українських канадських професіоналістів і підприємців Оттави Роберт Сейчук зазначив: «З кожним роком наша організація надає дедалі більшу підтримку стажерам про-

грами ППКУ упродовж їхнього перебування в Оттаві. Соціяльний контекст мовного вибору

Україна здобула незалежність - політичну, проте не економічну чи культурну мирним шляхом, і тому еліту старого режиму не було ані засуджено, ані вигнано, а інфраструктуру виробництва та розповсюдження, що тримала Україну в російськомовному просторі, не розібрано. Але щоб здобути культурну незалежність, Україна повинна залишити російськомовний простір і приєднатися до англомовного, як це зробили Монголія та Польща. Саме так Україна й усі її громадяни стануть невідокремною частиною Европи та світу. Й через це не можна обмежувати обговорення мовної політики в громадському просторі до рамок народництва: нібито мова є «вільним вибором громадянина». Тому дуже непокоїть опублікована в «Критиці» (2006, ч. 11) стаття Домініка Ареля «Залучення відокремленого», у якій автор пропонує російській мові регіональний статус. Арель, як і більшість зацікавлених, зовсім іґнорує структури й інституції, які вирішують за людей, що їм вибирати.

Громадський мовний простір України став російськомовним через свідому урядову політику, яка скеровувала російських поселенців і мобільних неросійських мігрантів із



села в російськомовну міську культуру та дозволяла російським міським поселенцям працювати й задовольняти свої культурні та духовні потреби в просторі російської мови та культури. Не бачачи потреби вивчати українську мову, мільйони російськомовних, що їх витворила совєтська політика, культурно й інтелектуально були зорієнтовані на Москву. Завдяки мирному здобуттю незалежности вони не мусили еміґрувати з України, як французи з Алжиру, німці із Судетів або англійці з Африки чи Індії. Залишені при владі русофільські еліти не запровадили ефективного законодавства, аби усунути базову інфраструктуру російськомовного простору, створеного за совєтської доби.

Після 1991 року більшість міського населення визнала легітимність української держави, але мало хто змінив інтелектуальну та культурну зорієнтованість на Москву чи перейшов на використання української мови. Оскільки ринок не пропонував і не пропонує достатньої кількости україномовної продукції, не було й немає підстав для такого переходу. Немає сенсу говорити про «вільний вибір» послуговуватися українською в Україні, оскільки станом на 2000 рік

лише 10% щорічного друку книг, 12% журналів, 18% телевізійних програм і 35% газет виходили українською мовою, решта є російськомовними. До того ж ці відсотки суттєво поменшають, якщо

врахуємо російськомовні видання і передачі з Росії, що заполонюють Україну. Ми всі знаємо, скільки україномовного товару в кіосках. За останні два роки зросла частка україномовних та субтитрованих телевізійних програм і кінофільмів, але інституціональна інфраструктура досі схиляє людей послуговуватися російською мовою. Окрім того, від 2005 до 2010 року Кремль видаватиме 800 млн. рублів державних грошей на виробництво та розповсюдження російськомовної авдіовізуальної та друкованої продукції в колишніх неросійських совєтських республіках, штучно підтримуючи в такий спосіб мовну русифікацію неросіян поза межами Росії.

В Україні від 1991 року певною мірою існує інфраструктура для україномовної науки, великої політики та високої культури. Проте сучасна культура складається не лише з «класики». Вона містить чимало друкованого, відзнятого та записаного сміття, а інституційна інфраструктура масової культури в Україні є російськомовною. Видання дешевої україномовної авдіовізуальної продукції, масових щоденних газет чи белетристики, не цікавлять олігархів, як-от Ахметова чи Суркіса. Утримувати країну в російськомовному просторі допомагають і неросійські іноземні власники: скажімо, 12 глянцевих журналів, що їх видає пан Джед Санден, усі виходять російською, тобто Санден - людина, що підтримує політичну незалежність України, - сприяє культурній залежності України від ії колишнього імперського володаря. Великі міжнародні об'єднання глянцевих журна-
лів - такі, як «Вигда» і «8\УІ88 Медіа Сгоир» - не випускають україномовних версій своїх видань.

Ці речі є принциповими для розуміння мовної проблеми, тому що вибір робиться не у вакуумі, а в певних умовах. Арель пропонує залишити інфраструктуру такою, як вона є, апелюючи до того, що це буцімто зробить російськомовних осіб лояльними. Інші говорять про абстрактні «права» або приваби мови, не згадуючи про реалії виробництва та розповсюдження, а також потреби принаймні всіх освічених громадян України нарешті вийти у світ після 200 років колоніяльної ізольованости і вивчати світову міжнародну мову спілкування - англійську.

На чому базується Арелеве припущення, нібито російськомовні українські громадяни незадоволені нинішнім мовнокультурним становищем і не є лояльними? Чи він має їх усіх за комуністів або чорносотенців? Я радше припускаю, що російськомовні мовці є переважно лояльними. Вони усвідомлюють, що громадський простір фактично є російськомовним, і не нарікають, якщо їм доводиться віддавати дітей до українських шкіл, читати вказівники й заповнювати офіційні документи українською цим і вичерпується зв'язок з українською мовою, якого російськомовні не можуть уникнути. Нарікають на теперішню ситуацію тільки налаштовані на відновлення старого ладу лідери Партії регіонів, на кшталт покійного Кушнарьова, і такі екстремісти, як Наталія Вітренко. Вони штучно загострюють мовне питання, бо знають, що утримання України в російськомовному просторі зміцнить її дальше підпорядкування Росії та їхній ста-

тус місцевих князьків. Неосовєтські русофільські політики, не просто байдужі, а ворожі до використання української мови в громадському просторі, не скасували оподаткування на внутрішні україномовні публікації, а тому російськомовні видання в Україні часто дешевші за україномовні чи англомовні, значно більше поширюються і є набагато доступнішими. У Донецьку, 38% населення якого становлять російськомовні росіяни, виходить безліч російськомовних газет і журналів. Україномовна газета є одна. 2005 року місцеві політики припинили субсидування в розмірі 43 тисяч гривень, яке доти надавали школам і бібліотекам на купівлю української газети, й вклали 800 тисяч гривень у ці ж заклади для купівлі трьох головних російських газет. Ті самі політики скаржаться на порушення прав російськомовного населення і висловлюються за офіційний статус російської мови.

Із такої перспективи питання звучить так: чи Арель підтримує таку крайню позицію? Аналогічна ситуація склалася б, якби французи та їхні місцеві колаборанти в Алжирі або японці та їхні колаборанти в Кореї повернулися до влади після формального відокремлення цих країн від старих імперій, і тоді, як частина зусиль із відновлення імперських пут, зробили мову старої імперії офіційною в цих країнах. Так само як такий розвиток подій був би рецептом політичної катастрофи в тих країнах, наміри екстремістської реставраційної меншини України сьогодні є рецептом нестабільности у Східній Европі.

За логікою, немає обов'язкового співвідношення між мововжитком та політичною відданістю. З поведінки укра-

футбольних фанів їнських улітку 2006 року видно, що українські російськомовні мовці можуть бути українськими патріотами. Шотландці, ірландці, американці, австралійці та канадці висловлюють свій націоналізм англійською. Корсиканці та бретонці використовують для цього французьку. Також і з російськомовних громадян України мало хто підтримує політичне об'єднання з Росією. Натомість вони критично сприймають політику Путіна щодо України й не хочуть, щоб їх асоціювали з Росією. Все це свідчить про цікаву можливу перспективу для України стати східноевропейською Ірландією. Але чи личить тверезим політикам бути азартними гравцями, коли російські екстремісти роблять із Криму Північну Ірландію?

Депутати, які ухвалювали закон про державність української мови, не передбачили в ньому судових санкцій. Як наслідок, неможливо когось звинуватити в його порушенні. И далі, хоча англійська вже була в 1991 році світовою мовою, урядники не зробили її обов'язковою для вивчення в школі. Без книжкового ринку, який це зобов'язання створило би, жодна англомовна компанія не мала економічних підстав облаштовуватися в Україні, щоби видавати доступні версії своїх видань. Як наслідок, через 15 років після здобуття незалежности українські бібліотеки не можуть дозволити собі купувати англомовні книжки. Відповідно, учні досі користуються російськомовними книжками для вивчання неукраїнських тем. Це посилює участь середньостатистичної освіченої людини у російськомовному просторі і тримає її в ізольованості від решти світу, який розмовляє англійською. Окремі люди вчать англійську, але Україна має найнижчий показник володіння англійською мовою у Східній Европі.

Отож російське панування у громадському просторі підтримує русофільську інтелектуальну орієнтацію та перешкоджає створенню ментальних і культурних зв'язків із рештою світу, яка розмовляє англійською. Чи Арель каже нам миритися з цим і впроваджувати політику, яка відокремлює Україну від англомовного світу? Що дасть українцям, які шукають добру роботу в ЕС, знання російської?? Якщо російськомовним мовцям допечуть спроби впровадити українську мову в громадському просторі, вони можуть тікати в Росію, яка радо запрошує імміґрантів. Якщо україномовним допече де-факто російськомовність громадського простору, куди тікати їм?

За обставин, коли стара інфраструктура й після 1991 р. виробляє та розповсюджує дешеву російськомовну продукцію, своє «право» на мову може використовувати тільки російськомовне населення. Ту ж таки російську згодом неодмінно «обере» й решта, бо дешевої продукції жодною іншою мовою, навіть українською, на ринку немає. Лояльні російськомовні громадяни України усвідомлюють, що фактично громадський простір є російськомовним, але визнають, що їм, оскільки вони живуть в Україні, слід знати українську мову. Вони також не в захваті від ідеї пов'язання з автократією Путіна та з її війною. Проте екстремістська меншість і Партія регіонів намагаються надати російській мові офіційного статусу і тримати цим Україну в російськомовному просторі. Така залежність від Росії дає їм багатство і владу, і їм байдуже, що вони ізолюють російськомовних мовців усіх національностей від світу, який розмовляє англійською і в якому освічені люди кожної країни вивчають англійську як другу мову. Це поведінка не державних діячів, а обласних партійних секретарів. Науковці,що досліджують мовні питання, не можуть ігнорувати цього контексту, як це робить Домінік Арель, бо Кремль і Регіони його не ігнорують.

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53-я Генеральна Асамблея Асоціації Атлантичного Союзу



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З 31 жовтня по 3 листопада 2007 року Канада приймала у себе делегатів Асоціації Атлантичного Союзу з 48 країн світу.

53 Генеральна Асамблея Асоціації Атлантичного Союзу з'єднала у своїх лавах делегатів неурядових організацій з 26 країн-членів НАТО, партнерів Північно-Атлантичного Союзу заради миру, та партнерів, з якими протягом останніх років ведеться плідна співпраця. Члени молодіжного крила Союзу (YATA) також брали участь в Асамблеї.

Асоціація Атлантичного Союзу (АТА) була створена на конференції в Гаазі 18 червня 1954 року, завдяки вагомій підтримці Державного Секретаря Канади з питань зовнішніх відносин містера Персона, майбутнього прем'єр-міністра Канади. Необхідність формування такої організації легітимується через потребу висвітлення цінностей та мети Північно-Атлантичного Союзу в освітній сфері серед країн-членів НАТО та країн-партнерів, координацією досліджень пов'язаних з тематикою НАТО, сприянням солідаризації осіб Північно-Атлантичного регіону, підтриманням та інформуванням про нові або щойно посталі демократії Центральної та Східної Європи, а також через розвиток постійних стосунків і співпраці між різними асоціаціями з метою створення надійної платформи для забезпечення миру та безпеки.

Натомість стратегічним завданням ҮАТА є поширення співробітництва між молоддю у країнах членах НАТО та країнах партнерах заради миру та безпеки. Членом ҮАТА може стати будь-яка соціально активна молода людина або молоді науковці - чиї дослідження пов'язані з тематикою Північно-Атлантичного Союзу певної країни-члена або партнера НАТО. Такими є цілі YATA: 1) побудова діалогу взаєморозуміння серед молодих людей різної національної, релігійної, етнічної та іншої приналежності; 2) генерація ідей та проведення різного роду дебатів щодо міжнародної політики та зовнішніх відносин, де особлива увага надаватиметься таким організаціям як НАТО,

ЄС, ООН, ОБСЄ і т.д.; 3) вироблення можливостей для молодих людей вивчати міжнародну політику через такі освітні заходи як семінари та Інтернет дебати.

Фактично, YATA є частиною ATA, яка ще тільки перебуває на стадії розвитку та, відповідно, не є такою впливовою організацією як ATA. Натомість, YATA може впливати на рішення всієї Асоціації через своїх представників, які також обираються на загальних зборах делегатів YATA.

Цьогорічна асамблея була присвячена такій темі: «НАТО та глобальні партнери: перебудова Афганістану». Протягом конференції також було розглянуто такі важливі аспекти як активність Канади в Афганістані, співробітництво НА-ТО-Росія, взаємовідносини НАТО-Китай, розширення та можлива трансформація НА-ТО. Серед тих, хто брав участь в обговоренні вищезазначених питань можна зазначити таких осіб як Джулі Лідхоут (Президент Атлантичного Со-

юзу Канади), Роберт Хунтер (Президент Асоціації Атлантичного Союзу), Фатмір Медіу (Міністр оборони Албанії), Омар Самад (Посол Афганістану у Канаді), Сергій Рябков (представник МЗС Pociii), Лусхан Сун (радник По-Кисольства таю у Канаді) та ін.

Більша частина Асамблеї була присвячена обговоренню досягнень військових сил НАТО в Афганістані, де значний вклад припадає на Канаду.

Військова місія Канади в Афганістані почалася після бомбардування США 11 вересня 2001 року. Канада значно збільшила свій вплив в Афганістані після повалення режиму Талібан восени 2001 року. За шість місяців, починаючи з червня й до листопада 2006 року, Канада також взяла на себе командування головними військовими силами під назвою Мультинаціональна бригада Південних сил.

З часом збільшення військової місії в Афганістані, «Провінційна команда з реконструкції» (PRT) також має осіб канадської агенції з міжнародного розвитку. PRT має подвійну мету: забезпечення воєнної безпеки та співробітництво з місцевими лідерами у справах реконструкції.

Гропіі з Канади було використано для надання маленьких позик для більш ніж 140 000 осіб в Афганістані, 89 відсотків з яких жінки.

Канада також бере участь у тренуванні поліції й армії Афганістану. Група інструкторів з військових сил Канади були в Кабулі задля тренування членів Національної Армії Афганістану. Вони залишалися в Кабулі, коли решта Канадського контингенту просунулася далі на південь до Кандагару.

Делегація з України складалася з 10 членів як АТА так і ҮАТА: Олег Кокочинський (АТА, Голова делегації), Сергій Джердж (АТА), Ілько Кучерів (АТА), Анатолій Скляров (ҮА-ТА), Роман Брух (ҮАТА), Дмитро Панчук (ҮАТА), Руслана Костіна (ҮАТА), Любомир Регуш (ҮАТА), Алла Мишалова (ҮАТА), Февзі Амзаєв (ҮАТА).

Починаючи з того часу, ко-

ли Україна обрала вектор «про-НАТО», завданнями української делегації на таких заходах є: бути поінформованими про хід домовленостей, обговорень, завдань, а також щодо тактичної і стратегічної мети Атлантичного Союзу; поглиблення взаємовідносин з організаціями АТА і YATA з інших країн та висловлення офіційної позиції України з того чи іншого питання Асамблеї Атлантичного Союзу та її молодіжному крилу.

Головним досягненням української делегації цього року можна вважати те, що за попередніми домовленостями Генеральна Асамблея Асоціації Атлантичного Союзу у 2009 році проходитиме в Києві. Відносно результатів молодіжної делегації з України можна додати, що вони домовились про співробітництво з представниками YATA з інших країн з питання розширення діяльності у всьому світі.

БЕЗСМЕРТНИЙ ШЕВЧЕНКО В ЯЛТІ

(ППКУ – Київ). У Ялті 8 грудня 2007 р. відбулося урочисте відкриття пам'ятника співцеві українського народу Тарасові Шевченку. З гордістю й зворушенням відлитий у бронзі трьохметровий монумент відкрила Наталка Бундза-Іваницька, вдова Василя Іваницького, стараннями якого була проведена міжнародна кампанія збирання коштів на встановлення ще одного пам'ятника поетові.

Кримчани з Керчі, Феодосії, Алушти, Ялти, Сак, Севастополя, Бахчисарая, Сімферополя та Євпаторії, а також представники з Києва, Львова, Івано-Франківська, Торонто (Канада), прибули до перлини Чорного моря, щоб стати свідками видатної події. Церемонія розпочалася співом національного гімну України та гімну Автономної Республіки Крим у виконанні Ялтинського духового оркестру. Вітальне слово виголосили Голова Верховної Ради Криму Анатолій Гриценко, голова Ради Міністрів Криму Віктор Плакіде, представник президента Віктора Ющенка Володимир Хоменко та мер Ялти Сергій Брайко. Свої привітання висловили директор Української фундації імені Тараса Шевченка Орест Косик, президент Кримської фундації імені Тараса Шевченка Богдан Вуйко, Гетьман Українського Реєстрового Козацтва Анатолій Шевченко та головний отаман Українського Ресстрового Козацтва Анатолій Франчук. На відкритті пам'ятника Тарасові Шевченку виступили також депутат міськради Наталя Чарочникова від організації «Берегиня» та директор української школи в Ялті Олена Газизова. Директор Парламентарної програми «Канада-Україна» Ігор Бардин з Торонто виступив з привітанням від імені української громади в Канаді. У своєму слові Ігор Бардин сказав: «Своїм духовним натхненням Тарас Шевченко обіймав всю Україну. У складі Археографічної комісії він побував на Київщині, Черкащині, Запоріжжі, Чернігівщині і Полтавщині. Мріяв він побувати і в Криму. «Хоч на старість подивитися, що таке та славна Чорноморщина», - писав поет до українського письменника Якова Кухаренка, який служив у Чорноморському козачому війську. Не судилося Шевченкові побувати в Криму за життя. Пройшли роки, проминули століття, а його творчі скарби залишилися. І сьогодні він прибув до кримської перлини – Ялти, де навічно постав у бронзі. Постав як символ єдності України, як світоч, як запорука в серцях краян у любові до України. Духовне джерело пам'ятника Тарасові Шевченку в Ялті розпочинає свою історію».

Під час церемонії відкриття монумента Шевченкові Ялтинський духовий оркестр виконував «Молитву за Україну» Миколи Лисенка. По закінченні урочистої частини на площі відбулася літературно-музична програма. Учні української гімназії м. Ялти та ансамбль бандуристів Кримського державного гуманітарного університету виконали пісню «Вітре буйний» та інші музичні композиції. Учні школи з Левадії прочитали поезії Шевченка, і культурна програма завершилась виступами ансамблів бандуристів зі Львова та Сак.

Сквер Тараса Шевченка, який тепер став домівкою для нового пам'ятника великому Кобзареві, розташований на Московській вулиці, яка проходить паралельно до Київської вулиці, і знаходиться в центрі Ялти. Відтепер Ялта доєдналася до таких визначних міст, як Буенос Айрес, Вашингтон, Вінніпег, Париж, Москва, Санкт-Петербург, Торонто, Нью-Йорк, Київ, Луганськ, Енкарнаціон, Курітіба, Тбілісі, Монреаль та Львів, де встановлено пам'ятники Шевченкові, і які складають данину великому співцю українського народу. За кілька тижнів до церемонії відкриття пам'ятника у Ялті в місцевих газетах з'явилися статті про невідомого Шевченка та про церемонію відкриття. У цих статтях йшлося про контроверсійне зображення Шевченка радянським режимом як старої людини, такого собі діда, незважаючи на той факт, що Шевченкові було лише 47 років на момент його смерті. Пам'ятник, встановлений у Ялті, був спроектований канадцем Левом Молем, і зображає гордого й молодого поета, який мав визначені та сформовані погляди. Поета, який майже передбачив ті випробування, що його батьківщина переживатиме навіть після його смерті, але розумів, що його поезія стане серцем і душею нації, яка врешті переможе.

Слід зауважити, що більшість представників Ялтинської міськради, які належать до Партії регіонів, підтримали рішення про встановлення пам'ятника Шевченкові у сквері Тараса Шевченкові у сквері Тараса Шевченка, і тепер проходить рух за перейменування вулиці, на якій знаходиться цей сквер, на вулицю Шевченка. Наступним відповідним кроком буде встановлення пам'ятника Тарасові Шевченку та традиційних українських землях Кубані.

За три дні перебування тут ми встигли охопити безмежну програму. Вже в перший день по приїзду ми пішли прогулятися містом, принаймні, хоч трошки збагнути, де ми знаходимося. Вечірня прогулянка до бізнес центру, CN Tower і озера Онтаріо не лишила нікого байдужим. Вже тоді склалося перше враження від міста – здивування від того, як примудряються уживатися разом люди багатьох національностей, приємність від великої кількості присутності рідного, українського (від мови, що лунає звідусіль, до поваги до нашої нації), а також неочікуваний спокій на вулицях здавалося б того міста, де має життя кипіти і литися через край. Також приємно було спостерігати білочок, що спритно стрибають від дерева до дерева, і єнотів, що мирно співіснують з людьми.

Важко перерахувати все, що відбулося за два дні. Зараз здається, що минув як мінімум тиждень, бо стільки накопичилося подій і вражень. Ми провели три офіційні зустрічі – з редактором газети "Гомін України", представниками фінансової компанії SunLife і представником від НАТО. Також ми мали нагоду про-

вести час за власним бажанням. Тут смаки розділилися. Деякі пішли до озера покататися на човні, деякі побігли до китайського району скуповувати друзям подарунки. Ми вирішили заглянути до Торонтського університету і відвідати Royal museum. Прогулянка вийшла дуже цікавою. В університеті до нас поставилися приязно, відповідали на всі наші питання і закликали повертатися сюди на навчання, але, на жаль, так і не дали підказки, як це зробити. Втім, маючи бажання, я впевнена це легко зробити, і абсолютно із задоволенням. Життя канадських студентів сильно відрізняється від нашого. Пройшовшись по території кампуса, поспостерігавши за молоддю. Захотілося засісти за підручники, взятись за нову наукову роботу абощо. Їх життя виглядає повністю організованим - від навчального процесу до поїздок закордон, додаткових клубів тощо. Людина не вигадує велосипеда, не рветься не знати куди через нереалізацію себе. Вона не витрачає сили марно. Бо має варіанти, серед яких і обирає найбільш їй відповідні. Я сьогодні із захопленням дивилася на забавну гру у сквош, на гарячі дебати якихось питань, на купи книжок в руках студентів, на зручний стиль одягу і просту невимушену поведінку... Канада...
